I delayed my jump from about 11,000 feet to the clouds at 2,000 feet.

I had an easy landing on my seat in the middle of a field. What looked like the whole population of the nearby town turned out to meet me. I thought that I was caught. I gathered up my parachute. The people at first thought that I was German because of my close cropped hair. When I held up my parachute with USA on it, one man grabbed my parachute and another took me to a house. The 1111 crowd followed. I showed my phrase list, pointed out that I was an American aviator and asked for civilian clothes. While I was giving out American cigarettes someone brought meseme civilian clothes.

In a few minutes a man came for me, and from that place my journey was arranged. Some days later I met Sgt BERGERON and traveled with him.

Sgt BERGERON:

### Appendix B

- 1. The following information has been obtained from an officer and a mergeant who evaded capture in enemy occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but in that cas it is important not to divulge any details about the so ree.

Statement of information covering the period from 11 February 1944 to 19 March 1944

- a. In February informants saw Me 109's and FW 190's flying from the airfield just outside of CREIL. The saw three batteries of three gans each three protecting the field.
- b. Informants were told that a factory making airplane parts is located at CREIL on the road to MONTATAIRE.
- c. Informants noticed near St BRIEUC a small airfield quite well guarded and protected by barbed wire.
- d. Traveling from CREI<sup>L</sup> to Paris in early March and from Paris to St BRIEUC informants noticed that most of the reilroad yards were crowded with war materials: trucks, bombs, and guns including 88-mm's.
- e. The French seemed very tired and are most anxious for the allied landing. The delay allows the Germans to make effective propaganda.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area;

The Commanding Officers,

Base Commands;

Director, Bureau of Public Relations,

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.

2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.

3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.

4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.

5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which superscies letter, AG 883.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

  - (1) The names of those who helped you.
  - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
  - (3) The route you followed.
  - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
  - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
  - You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures,
  - You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.

    No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the

theater,
